

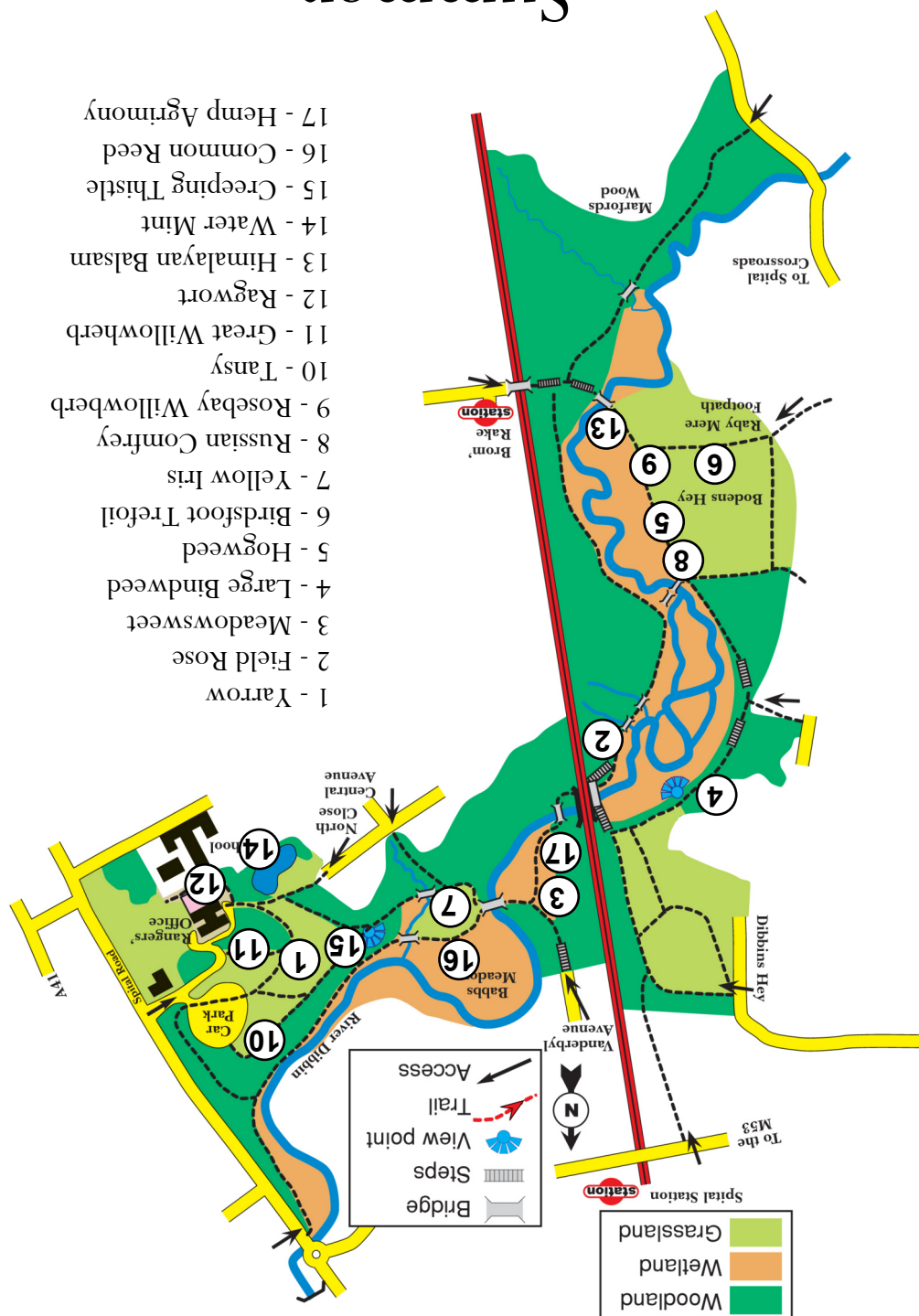

Dibbinsdale Local Nature Reserve

Dibbinsdale Local Nature Reserve is a SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest).

The picking of wild flowers is an offence. Visitors are asked to keep to the footpaths to avoid damage to the plants.

Visit the walled garden (part of the Brotherton Centre) and see how a variety of wild flowers are being cultivated. Many of these are for sale. Also in the garden can be seen organic gardening and composting being practised. A water recycling project with pumps powered by solar and wind power helps irrigate the site.

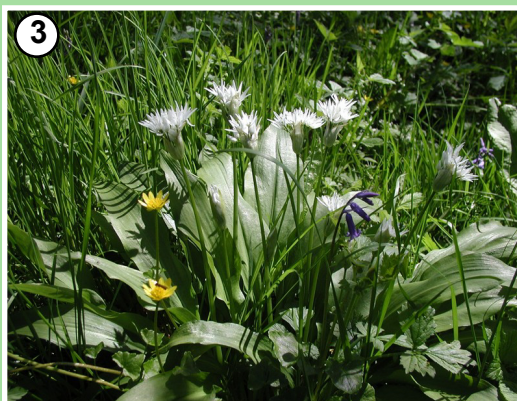
